Stoke Poges News is one of our main ways of communicating with the village, other than our noticeboards and social media. This magazine is published quarterly and we often find that there is information that needs to be shared between issues. Not all channels of communication work for everyone, and in response to your feedback we decided to supplement our existing methods with an email service which villagers can subscribe to.

Stoke Poges Newsflash

Launched in August, our new service is called *Stoke Poges Newsflash*. It is a regular email newsletter, bringing you bitesize pieces of local news and information from the Parish Council and village organisations directly to your inbox.

You'll get timely updates and reminders of things that fall outside the quarterly publishing schedule of *Stoke Poges News*,

which will continue to feature larger articles about all the great things that happen in the village.

When you subscribe, we ask for the name of your road and also your postcode in case we need to send specific information to people living in a certain part of the village. We will not pass your information on to third parties.

Once you have submitted the form you will receive an email which will ask you to click a button to confirm your subscription. If the email hasn't appeared in your inbox within a few minutes, please check your spam folder.

South Bucks Riding for the Disabled

May saw the 60th anniversary of South Bucks RDA, marked by a visit from Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal.

Councillors Carter and Crocker were invited to attend and greet The Princess Royal. It was a tremendous privilege to both represent our village and also see the amazing work carried out within our parish.

Stoke Poges Neighbourhood Plan

Also in May, our Neighbourhood Plan was fully adopted. We are pleased to report that the plan gave huge support in opposing a planning application for an extension that substantially differed from the original approved design. The Parish Council contended that there had also been significant changes in planning policy, with the Neighbourhood Plan having progressed and Buckinghamshire Council creating a Local Heritage List which included the building next door to the site. In this case, the

Buckinghamshire Council Planning Committee went against the officer's report in making their decision, with issues raised by the Parish Council given significant weight.

The Parish Council will continue to use the Neighbourhood Plan and other policies to defend the character of our village, where appropriate.

Sefton Business Park

As reported in the last issue of *Stoke Poges News*, Sefton Business Park has been sold. The Parish Council has been in discussions with the agent acting on behalf of the new owners to gain an understanding of their plans for the site.

Under the new government guidelines, Sefton Business Park is now considered to be grey belt land, and is therefore exempt from some of the protections offered when previously green belt. This means that development will come forward, but exactly what that will look like is still being decided.

We are currently awaiting a further meeting to discuss their master plan. Following on from that there will be a public meeting which we will ensure is widely advertised.

Chiltern Way Academy Sefton Park

Located in School Lane, this is a new school providing education and support to children and young people with special educational needs.

The maximum number of pupils the school expects to cater for is 70, but this September's intake is one class of approximately ten students.

When the Parish Council was initially notified that there might be a new school in Stoke Poges, we very quickly arranged several discussions with the CEO to better understand the impact this might have on our village and nearby residents in particular. Because of the proximity to the Pioneer Academy, we raised concerns and issues around noise, traffic and parking.



The academy also held an open evening in May which was attended by Buckinghamshire Council's Service Director of Education and Inclusion and the Commissioner for Schools. Residents were able to express their support alongside concerns and worries. The school is working with Buckinghamshire Council and Highways to see if there can be any changes made to the entrance to the school. However, as it is a Grade II listed building this will require planning permission and careful consideration. The Parish Council and local residents will be given an opportunity to comment on any potential forthcoming planning application.

The school will trial a voluntary one way system for cars to enter via School Lane and leave via Hockley Lane. In the meantime, the school has made it clear that there will be an expectation around the behaviour of parents, carers and taxi drivers to respect the locality.

The school is keen to start with a positive working relationship and embed themselves within the village and our community. If residents have concerns please let the Parish Council know and we will do our best to work with all concerned to seek solutions.

Antisocial behaviour

We have had reports of antisocial behaviour (ASB) in the village in recent weeks. The Parish Council and unitary councillors have been in talks with Thames Valley Police and the ASB Team at Buckinghamshire Council to better understand how this might be managed.

If for any reason villagers feel threatened or experience bad behaviour, please report it to Thames Valley Police by calling 101, or 999 in an emergency.

Threeways Surgery

Councillors Carter and Crocker have been working with the surgery for some months to see how rapid changes in healthcare delivered by the NHS are affecting our residents. This came about mainly because we know that Stoke Poges has the highest proportion of 65-85 year olds in Buckinghamshire – higher than the national average – so digital changes are bound to present problems for some of our villagers.

There have been some very positive conversations and exchanges of ideas which will hopefully have a positive impact. The surgery is looking at ways to roll out workshops and support groups to guide patients through these changes.

More information will follow as it becomes available. In the meantime, Dr. Pope has organised a session at the Village Hall on Thursday 4th September from 5pm - 6.30pm, to give an update on current services and the surgery's limitations versus expectations. There will be an opportunity to ask questions, but if you are unable to attend you can leave advance questions in the box available at the surgery reception or email threeways.reception@nhs.net



This initiative is supported by the Parish Council and the Patient Participation Group (PPG).

The global publishing tycoon Robert Maxwell made the headlines about 30 years ago when he apparently fell overboard from his luxury yacht.

He made a vast fortune from creating an enormous steel empire, becoming the richest man in the US and financing the Carnegie Hall and many other foundations and universities.



South Bucks Riding for the Disabled Association (SBRDA) was recently honoured to welcome Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal in celebration of the centre's 60th anniversary.

The visit in May marked a major milestone for the charity, which has spent six decades enriching the lives of disabled and neurodivergent children and adults through therapeutic horse riding and equestrian activities.

As President of RDA UK, The Princess Royal has long been a supporter of the organisation's work. During her visit, she met with volunteers, riders, coaches and trustees, taking time to learn about the centre's history, its impact on the local community, and its plans for the future.

"It was a tremendous honour to have HRH The Princess Royal join us for this very special occasion," said Di Redfern, Chair of South Bucks RDA. "Her continued support and dedication to the RDA movement means so much to our riders, volunteers, and supporters. Today's celebration is something that our community will never forget."

The Princess Royal toured the facilities, observed riding sessions in action, and unveiled a commemorative bench to mark the centre's Diamond Jubilee. She also spoke with some of the centre's most longstanding riders and volunteers, who were all thrilled to meet her.

About the charity

South Bucks RDA provides people with the opportunity to ride and have equine interaction to benefit their health and wellbeing. We are inclusive and welcome participants with physical, sensory and learning disabilities, autism, ADHD, long-term physical and mental health conditions.

In May 1965, the Bucks and Berks Riding for the Disabled Centre was opened at East Burnham Park near Farnham Royal, the home of Colonel and Mrs VDS Williams.

In 1967, it was decided that since no riders had come from Berkshire in the two years that the group had been running (Slough was in Buckinghamshire in those days) the name of the group would change to reflect this, and South Bucks RDA was born.

Di Redfern was then a Coach at East Burnham Park, and when the Colonel died the new owner asked the group to leave and find a new home for their four ponies. Mr Redfern agreed to allow the group to move to his home, Mill House Farm on Framewood Road, and we have been there ever since.

At that time there were just fields, so the centre as it is today grew gradually. There wasn't an indoor school for nearly twenty years.

Since those early days, hundreds of individuals with physical and learning disabilities have benefitted from its programmes, helping to build confidence, mobility and independence through the power of horses. Some have gone on to become National and Olympic Champions in the sport of para dressage, including Sophie Christiansen, Natasha Baker and Julie Payne.

The anniversary celebration reflects on the charity's inspiring legacy and looks ahead to continued innovation and inclusivity in equestrian therapy.

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
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BucksVision

Making a positive difference to the lives of blind and partially sighted people

BucksVision has a wonderful team of volunteers who organise and run social groups for people living with a sight condition.

The organisation was founded in 1911 and was formerly known as Buckinghamshire Association for the Blind. Today, there are several geographic divisions covering Buckinghamshire, and Stoke Poges is part of the South East Division. We're here to support you through all the stages and severity of sight loss. People lose their sight for a wide variety of reasons, including age related conditions, genetic conditions and eye-health problems. However, losing your sight does not necessarily mean losing your independence; nor does it mean that you need to struggle alone or feel isolated.

Our events offer an opportunity to meet with people who have experienced the same issues you may encounter with your sight loss, as well as enjoying entertainment, activities, informative talks and demonstrations plus refreshments. In Stoke Poges, our club meets on the second Tuesday of the month at St Andrew's Church hall. Transport is arranged to and from the venue, and whilst members are not charged a subscription to attend, donations are encouraged. We occasionally arrange pop-up events such as guided walks, cookery lessons, shopping trips and lunches.

We have 50 regular attendees across our events each month, with an age range of 30 to 100. Some are partially sighted, others are registered severely sight impaired and a few have no light perception (NLP) – a rare level of total blindness.

If you live in south east Buckinghamshire and have a visual impairment, get in touch to find out more about our charity and how you can access our local services. You're also welcome to come and visit us at St Andrew's on Tuesday 14th October from 2pm - 4pm.

Memorial Gardens celebrate their 90th anniversary


Ninety years ago, Stoke Poges Memorial Gardens were officially opened and dedicated as a garden of remembrance.

They were the brainchild of Sir Noel Mobbs, who – with considerable foresight – bought the land next to St Giles' Church and Gray's Monument to protect it from housing development.

He engaged Edward White, a leading landscape architect of the time, to design the land as a garden of remembrance. His brief to the designer was that it should be different from a traditional cemetery and look like a country garden.

His vision has stood the test of time, and ninety years later the gardens are still a place of peace, reflection and remembrance. They are enjoyed and appreciated by its many visitors and especially by the families and friends of those who are buried and remembered here.

We celebrated this milestone on Sunday 25th May with the help of the Friends of Stoke



Poges Memorial Gardens who served wonderful cream teas and cakes, and Chinnor Silver Band who entertained us on the lawn. Displays by The Stoke Poges Society and Stoke Poges Scouts informed visitors about the history of the Memorial Gardens and the surrounding area.

Meanwhile, Eddie and Madge, our resident beekeepers, brought along a display hive to give us a chance to see the inner workings of a beehive. Special thanks go to the anonymous donor who sponsored the ice cream van that supplied us with copious amounts of Mr Whippy!

Cllr Dev Dhillon gave a welcome to everyone and helped us unveil the Strings sculpture – the most recently added sculpture in the Bereavement Trail.

Sandra Greenslade, Chair of the Mobbs Memorial Trust, her brother David Mobbs and his wife Emma joined us. Sandra and David are great-grandchildren of Noel Mobbs. Sandra gave a wonderful address, weaving in the history and family connections to the gardens.

Our fairy house competition attracted nine entries from builders as young as brothers Jasper and Caspian (aged 3 and 5). Their entry 'Moss-Pine Lodge' won the People's Choice Award and a family ticket to Bekonscot Model Village. Runner-up was 'Redwood Cottage' by Phil and Helen.

The main first prize of a ticket to Stoke Park Fireworks Bonanza went to Anita and Olivia for 'Stoke Poges Cottage' – complete with a garden and aerial walkway.

Walking to St Giles' Church and Stoke Poges Memorial Gardens


If you ever have visitors from abroad, this is by far the best walk to take them on!

They will see and experience more about English rural living and history in a few hours than several days of sightseeing in London. St Giles' Church, Gray's Monument and the Stoke Poges Memorial Gardens are worldfamous, yet the walk from the centre of the village is surprisingly unknown.

The walk is about 4.5 to 5km long, depending

on how much you explore the wonderful Memorial Gardens, and is absolutely flat apart from the gentle Bells Hill as you leave the village centre.

Unfortunately, there are kissing gates which make walking with a buggy, or cycling, impossible. There is a large car park on the opposite side of the road to the Memorial Gardens so it is easy to cheat – and well worth it to see these magnificent locations – but get the real benefit by taking the family and visitors on the lovely walk described here.

As usual with these walks, we start at the village green. It is once again recommended to cross the road using the pedestrian crossing and walk down the lovely avenue of trees on the opposite side of the main road. The traffic is far enough away to feel fairly remote.

Walk all the way down Bells Hill until you reach the southern end of Rogers Lane.



When you arrive at the junction of Rogers Lane and Grays Park Road, there is a kissing gate on the opposite side of the road, right on the corner. Go through the gate and follow the path across the field to a second gate. Here you enter Hastings Meadow, a historical piece of land in the village. Bear slightly right, keeping the open fronted barn on your righthand side, and go through the kissing gate. The public footpath path passes through a corner of the old Clock House property before emerging back into Hastings Meadow.

Now, follow the path along the right of the field with the hedge on your immediate right.



You eventually come to a gate which takes you onto the pedestrian pavement of Park Road. There is a gate into the field directly opposite, but Park Road is busy and fast – please take extra, extra care at this crossing point.

Once you have crossed and gone through the gate you are in Gray's Field, a National Trust property. The path diverges here but take the right-hand option, keeping the hedge on your immediate right. You will see a monument off to the left, but avoid going that way for now – visit it on the way back.



Eventually, the path leads to a gate into the grounds of St Giles' Church. Go through and then turn right, though the lych gate, and walk toward the church.



St Giles' is an absolute treasure to explore and is of course world-famous as the place where the poet Thomas Gray wrote his 'Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard'.



As you approach the church, you will see two brick structures just in front of it. One of these is the tomb of Gray and some of his family.

Look to your left as you approach the tombs and you'll find a gate in the magnificent brick wall. This gate leads to the equally magnificent Memorial Gardens.

Go through the gate (this neatly avoids a busy, fast and dangerous road to the main entrance) and turn left on the gravel road.



Follow the road for a few tens of metres and you will arrive at the gardens' offices, where you can get maps and descriptions of the gardens and walks.

The Memorial Gardens themselves were funded by Sir Noel Mobbs, designed by Edward White, and opened in 1935. They are now a Grade I listed site and are looked after by a team of gardeners.



The gardens are full of lovely features, some obvious and some not so. You won't want to miss the heritage route along the lakeside and the main central area, but do also take time to explore the smaller paths. There are hundreds of little memorial areas, each one with its own story to tell.



The tranquil Colonnade Garden is a beautiful spot for quiet contemplation. This sunken water garden is enveloped by a raised wisteria-draped pergola. Channels of water crisscross the parterre, converging in an octagonal pond at the centre.

The spring blossom is a real delight here.



The Memorial Gardens offer great views of Stoke Park, with its famous golf course and lake

The elegant bridge was commissioned by John Penn, grandson of William Penn, founder of Pennsylvania, and designed by Humphrey Repton. It was restored in 2005.



When you have explored the gardens, leave through the gate you entered by, returning to St Giles' churchyard.

Follow the path back to the lych gate you came in at, but this time continue straight ahead and pass through the second lych gate.

You will now see in front of you a noticeboard with a map of Gray's Field and a path running along to the right. Follow this path and you will very shortly come to Gray's Monument.



Take your time exploring the monument, then leave over a stile directly opposite to the path you arrived on. The path will take you back across the field to the gate leading onto Park Road. Take care crossing Park Road and then retrace your steps back to the village. This is a lovely walk and includes three of the most wonderful sites to be visited in Stoke Poges. There are many websites that describe these sites and you are recommended to do some research in advance to find information about each one.

The Church of St Giles is Grade I listed and is recognised for its exceptional architectural and historical interest.

It dates from Saxon times, with remains still existing in areas of the chancel wall and windows. There are parts still surviving from three later periods: the pillars, part of the chancel and part of the tower date from the Norman era; the nave reconstructed on the Norman pillars are early Gothic (1220); and the Hastings Chapel, built in red-brick, dates from the Tudor period (1558).

The church underwent Victorian restoration in the 19th century, preserving much of its earlier character. While Stoke Poges is mentioned as far back as the Domesday Book in 1086, the church does itself does not get explicitly listed.

The original spire was replaced in 1834 and finally had to be removed in 1924 when it became unsafe. Timbers from the spire were used to construct the two lych gates along the churchyard path.

The opening scene in the 1981 film *For Your Eyes Only* starring Roger Moore was filmed in the churchyard, where James Bond lays flowers on the grave of his wife, Tracy.

However, St Giles' is most famously known for Thomas Gray's elegy, first published in 1751 and inspired by the tranquil churchyard. It is his final resting place, and a large memorial to him, erected in 1799, stands nearby.

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Simply Walk

A weekly walk around Stoke Poges

In May this year, a new outdoor activity began in our village.

Simply Walk is a Buckinghamshire Council initiative and the premise is simple, hence the name! Walkers of any age and ability are invited to join the group for a weekly walk around Stoke Poges. The aim is to give participants the opportunity to walk for fitness in a relaxed environment. The walks have additional benefits for mental health and wellbeing, giving those who take part access to a social and friendly group of likeminded people, helping to tackle social isolation and loneliness. Each walk is guided by a team of enthusiastic, trained volunteers from the village, who lead and back-mark.

The Simply Walk idea is now 23 years old and there are over 70 groups across the county, with more than two thousand walkers taking part, mostly on weekly walks. The Simply Walk group in Stoke Poges meets at 11am each Wednesday morning in the car park of St Andrew's Church. Currently, the walk is around the track in the recreation

ground and most of the walkers like to go around twice, or even three times. The group then returns to St Andrew's for refreshments at the Lighthouse Café.

The current walk is a so-called Grade 1 walk, which is the gentlest of walks in terms of terrain and pace. It is planned to have different walks around the village as and when the group's confidence grows, and each one will be carefully risk-assessed by a council official.

The group now has around fifteen regular walkers and the numbers are growing. You have to register in advance (for insurance purposes) but you can do that either online or by filling in a form before starting your first walk.

It is a fun and relaxing way to meet people, get some exercise and support the Lighthouse Café. Come and join us!

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
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Friday Club

Heritage open day to explore architecture

The promotion of our village heritage continued this summer with our stall at the Horticultural Society's Annual Show.

Earlier in the summer, Year 5 children at The Stoke Poges School heard about Victorian life in the parish as part of their 'Victorian Day'. They learnt about the early school building next door and the workhouse, now called Uplands, just across the road in Rogers Lane.

Meanwhile, Year 6 children studied the general history of Stoke Poges, especially during World War II. They learned of the enemy bombing of Slough and the odd few bombs which dropped in the village, together with stories of children evacuated from London living at Long Dene School in the Manor House.

This year we celebrate the 90th anniversary of the Memorial Gardens and the centenary of Stoke Poges people handing Gray's monument and the adjacent field to the National Trust. A Heritage Open Day will take place from 1pm to 4pm on Sunday 14th September at the Memorial Gardens, St Giles' Church and Gray's Monument in Church Lane. There will be an information desk at the entrance to the gardens.

The national theme this year for the Open Days is architecture. Therefore, there are plans to show information on the landscape architecture of Stoke Park and the two great monuments in the parish: to Sir Edward Coke (jurist) and Thomas Gray (poet).

At our Annual General Meeting in August, our Chairman, Harvey Whittam, gave a talk about the 14th century robber baron, Sir John



de Moleyns. Sir John lived in Stoke Poges and was close to Edward III, when not locked up for a variety of crimes!

Other events hosted by the society in the second half of the year will include our annual lunch, a talk on the topic of historical crimes in Buckinghamshire and Berkshire, and our Christmas social evening with entertainment from local celebrity Johnny Ball. More information on all of these can be found online

We are delighted to have received an autobiography of Eric Cecil Clarke. Born in 1917, his childhood was spent in Stoke Poges. He worked as a labourer and gardener in and around the village until September 1939, when he was enlisted in the army. It is hoped to publish some extracts of his 'simple' way of life between the world wars in a future issue of *Stoke Poges News*.

History of Stoke Poges: Part Eight

In this issue, we look at the history of Stoke Park in the 18th century, when the estate underwent major transformations which can be seen to this day. Little is recorded about events in the village in the early half of that century, yet plenty is recorded about the latter part in diaries, books and accounts.

Sir Robert Gayer of the Manor House, a wealthy London merchant, died in 1702. His son sold it to Edmund Halsey. It was Halsey who was the 'rags to riches' figure, who became very wealthy by owning a major London brewery. His only child, Anne, inherited his wealth and Stoke Park. She had married Sir Richard Temple, who was created Viscount Cobham. Their home was the grand house and estate of Stowe in north Buckinghamshire. Anne became known as Lady Cobham.

The changes to Stoke Park started in 1750 when, as a widow, Lady Cobham moved from Stowe back to the Manor House. She lived there with her lady friends until her death. She commissioned Lancelot 'Capability' Brown to landscape Stoke Park. He had already performed 'wonders' for her at Stowe. His legacy is the

transformation of five quadrangular pools to a river-like lake in Stoke Park.

Lady Cobham very much enjoyed Thomas Gray's poetry and became friends with him. Gray would spend time visiting his mother and aunt in Stoke Court, Rogers Lane, so was in Stoke Poges at the same time as Lady Cobham. Gray wrote the poem 'A Long Story' for her. It was inspired by the humorous, historical incidents at the Manor House, mixing fact with fiction.

In 1760, Thomas Penn bought Stoke Park following the death of Lady Cobham. He was the son of William Penn, the founder of what is now the State of Pennsylvania, USA. Fifteen years later, his son, John, inherited Stoke Park but initially spent very little time at the Manor House because he was living in America and on mainland Europe.

By 1789, the Manor House required extensive repairs and big changes were to follow. John had demolished much of the Manor House, leaving about a quarter of it that's still standing today. He was a wealthy young man. He had gained £130,000 in compensation for the loss of land in America and the English Parliament voted a £4,000 annual pension in recognition of the American losses.




The foundations were laid for the new Mansion House – the big white house. The architect used was Robert Naismith. The site to build the new house had been suggested by 'Capability' Brown and Field Marshal Sir George Howard of Stoke Place.

John changed his architect during the build to James Wyatt. Although John does not write about his decision to sack Naismith, a diary entry by one of his friends reveals that Naismith was overcharging and that Wyatt had become particularly fashionable amongst the elite in England.

John commissioned Humphrey Repton to landscape Stoke Park. In 1792, Repton produced his sales book of ideas for the estate, known as the Red Book. John loved the ideas, especially the grand vistas and panoramic view to Eton and Windsor. Despite today's tower blocks near Slough railway station, one can still see Windsor castle from the Mansion House.

It was in June 1799 when John decided upon erecting a monument to commemorate Sir Edward Coke. John's friend, the painter, Joseph Farrington, recorded that John was a little hurt at King George III saying to him on the terrace of the Mansion House, "What, a pillar to Sir Edward Coke too?". Many statues had been installed in the gardens around the house, and the 58 feet Doric column with a life-size statue of Sir Edward on the top may not have been built if John had caved in.

By the end of the 18th century, Stoke Park had significantly changed: the landscape had been remodelled twice; much of the Manor House gone and a new house had been built.

retaining the charm and character of the original village school.

The CWA Sefton Park team is enthusiastic about integrating into the local community and looks forward to forming close ties with village residents, groups and businesses over the coming months. Here are the details of Hedgerley Historical Society's autumn talks.



'A Potted Vision of Stoke Poges' with Harvey Whittam

Wednesday 17th September, 8pm

Join us for a whistle-stop tour of the heritage of Stoke Poges through the centuries from the Domesday Book to the late 20th century. The talk will deal with the most eminent people to have lived in the parish, such as, one of England's greatest jurists, Sir Edward Coke; the poet, Thomas Gray; and John Penn.

Unlike many other parishes, the prominence of more than one large country house features heavily in the talk. Several less well-known facts, unearthed from archives in recent times, are explored – from a general having to 'babysit' a Duke of York to a pope's Secretary of State being educated in the village.



'London's Lost Gardens' with Dr Todd Longstaffe-Gowan

Saturday 27th September, 2pm

This talk will focus on and celebrate the evanescence of London's vast and varied garden legacy. The gardens examined will range from the capital's humble allotments and defunct squares to amateur botanical gardens, princely pleasure grounds, artists' gardens and private menageries – gardens that have either vanished or that have changed beyond recognition.

'The History of Amersham Through Place Names' with Alison Bailey

Wednesday 15th October, 8pm

Why does Amersham have so many Stanleys? Westanley Avenue, Stanley Hill Avenue and Stanley Hill for example. How did Copperkins Lane get its name, or High & Over? Place names give us clues to our history, particularly local history, as the names of our streets and buildings often reflect local events and local people. Did a 9th century battle

with the Danes give Gore Hill its name or was Turpin Row named after the famous highwayman?

Join this talk to hear more stories about the origins of local place names, whether based on facts or local legends.

'Mavericks: Empire, Oil, Revolution and the Forgotten Battle of World War One' with Nick Higham

Saturday 25th October, 2.15pm

When Russia crashed out of the First World War following the Revolution in 1917, Britain was desperate to prevent its German and Turkish enemies seizing the oil-rich port of Baku on the Caspian Sea. But the country had few soldiers to spare and Baku was hundreds of miles from the nearest British army.

A ramshackle plan to block the Turks was thrown together by officials with little local knowledge, and a small group of enterprising, fearless and often reckless men were tasked with implementing it. Nick Higham's talk, based on his forthcoming book, tells the five men's story and that of the little-known Battle of Baku and its legacy.

'Searching the Tower of London Moat' with Jason Sandy

During recent excavation works at the Tower of London castle, Historic Royal Palaces conducted an archaeological survey of the



moat surrounding the site. Archaeologists and metal detectorists worked side by side to recover a wide variety of historic artefacts. In this lecture, we'll learn about the extraordinary objects they found. You won't believe the incredible history they uncovered which dates back to the Middle Ages!
